Earlier this summer I climbed a Scottish mountain with the rain falling as if I was being sprayed with a garden hose. I had to crawl the last 15 metres because the wind was so strong. On the way down the mountain the rain turned to sleet and then hail – the stones were so large I had to put a hat on under my hood to protect myself. At the bottom as I sucked a boiled sweet, my only food because I'd lost my wallet the day before and settled down to sleep in the car because I had no money. I reflected on a wonderful day and the life I have that enables me to enjoy the world.

This month and over the summer, I hope you will find some time to do the things that make you happiest: walking barefoot over a beach, sharing time with loved ones, emptying the in-box, an evening of dancing, having a picnic, waking up refreshed before the alarm! Holidays and times away are great times to reflect on what's important and what brings us happiness.

Research published earlier this year suggests that as a nation we have become miserable because we are selfish, unfit and anti-social. It reports that our happiness is limited by a blinkered approach to the world around us. The research also suggests that by addressing our deficiencies we could find more contentment: giving, relating, exercising, appreciating, trying out, direction, resilience, emotion, acceptance and meaning are reported to be the 10 things that make us happier.

What is it that makes you happy? The things that bring happiness are often not expensive – a conversation with a friend, the warmth of the sun, a home grown lettuce, a cup of tea in an armchair after a walk. Have you ever thought that going to church and becoming a member of the congregation might make you happier? Being a member of a church ticks many of the activities/attitudes recommended by the researchers into happiness - but you might find more than happiness. You might also find God.

May this month be joy filled.

LEAGUE OF FRIENDS OF FAIRFORD HOSPITAL

The Fairford Hospital League of Friends raised more than £18,000 as a result of its house-to-house collection this spring. It will help finance the organisation's increasing commitments to health work in the community. Commenting on the results, the League's chairman, David Phillips, said: "We are grateful to the volunteers who work so hard every year to help raise this sum and to the community at large for responding so generously." The news comes as the League is preparing for a new fund-raising initiative. It is opening a charity shop in Lechlade, and appealing for volunteers to help run it. A lease has been taken on the former bank premises and volunteers are fitting it out for opening on June 20th. Said Mr Phillips: "This is an ambitious first for the League of Friends but our increasing work in the community demands that we do everything we can to raise money to support it." Another initiative launched by the Friends this year was a highly successful open gardens event in Lechlade recently which raised a total of £841. The garden of Ablington Manor, near Bibury, will be open to the public on Sunday, June 26th, in aid of the League of Friends of Fairford Hospital. The manor is home to Robert and Pru Cooper. This fun-raiser follows the success of a similar event in Lechlade at the homes of John and Barbara McNaught and Gerrard Campbell, which raised more than £800.

GARDENING CLUB

Our afternoon at Southrop Manor was blessed with light showers (so welcome with this drought) and sunny spells - a perfect combination for seeing the garden at its very best. Our host, Carvn Hibbert, and her Head Gardener, Claudio, guided us through the garden where we saw a wonderful combination of herbaceous planting (full of summer colour), lawns with distant views over meadows to woodland, a wildflower river walk studded with wild orchids, a formal rose garden enclosed by a circle of yew and finally an organic kitchen garden, complete with chickens. All combined to give a perfect pastoral scene. Claudio, hugely knowledgeable and enthusiastic, gave us many tips for his successful organic work in the garden. Here are just a few! Alliums planted with roses (and vegetables) keeps pests at bay. A strong garlic solution sprayed on diseased plants will bring the plant to life again. Single flowers are more accessible for bees and insects than double flowers. More bees and insects attract more bird life. (Swallows eat insects, Red Kites eat the Swallows- all part of the food chain!) The soil from mole hills is marvellous as a sowing medium as it is rich and free of weed seeds, which moles eat (think twice about getting rid of that mole!) Water mint from the river is delicious in cooking.

Claudio is a chef and Ethno-Botanist (a specialist in the traditional application of plants, including food), and spent several years working at Kew. He uses his skills to grow, maintain, and produce food for the cookery school, in which he also cooks. We were given the most delicious tea with homemade scones and jams in the magnificent and welcoming Barn - all a huge treat - and we give our sincere thanks to Caryn Hibbert, Claudio and all their team. Our last visit before the summer break is on Tuesday, July 19th - an EVENING visit to Stowell Park, home of Lord and Lady Vestey. We meet there at 5.30pm, when the Head Gardener will give us a guided tour. We can bring our own picnics and stay on for the evening if we wish.
